In 1926, Loretto was founded by the Syracuse Diocese of the Roman Catholic Church as the first home of its kind in North America, with a mission to ensure older adults could live with purpose and dignity, and in 100 years it has not wavered.

A Century Strong, A Community Still in Need

As we celebrate 100 years of service, we also face an urgent reality. More than 75% of Loretto's residents rely on Medicaid as their primary payment source. While we proudly serve everyone regardless of their ability to pay—staying true to our mission as the region's safety-net provider—this commitment comes with a significant challenge: Medicaid reimbursement covers only 75-80% of the actual cost of care.

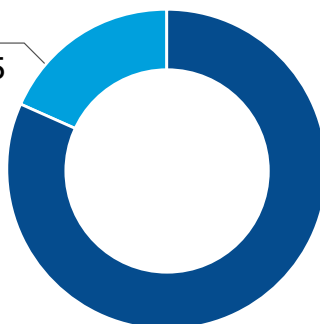
and to succeed and advance in their own lives.

Which begs the question: **Will long-term care options be available for all?**

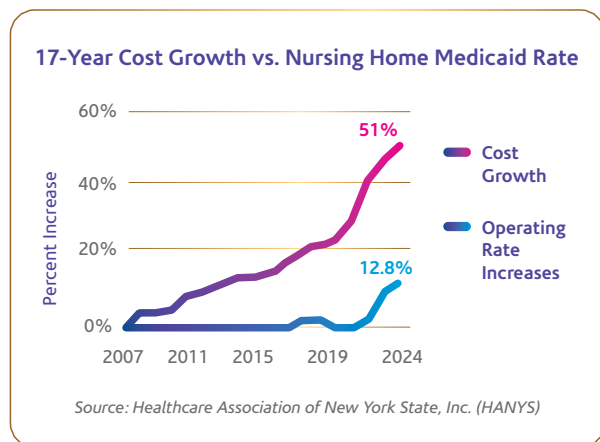
Loretto was founded by the Syracuse Diocese in 1926 for that very reason: to ensure long-term care services are

After an Early Alzheimer's Diagnosis, PACE Helped This Family Stay Strong-Together

Alzheimer's disease touches nearly 7 million Americans, and more than 11 million family members and friends step into the role of caregiver each year. Perhaps it's someone you know—your neighbor, your colleague, your friend. For one family, it was someone deeply loved. A beloved mother and grandmother, Gayle Lawler began showing signs of memory loss in her early 60s through small mistakes at work. With the support of her family, she sought testing and was diagnosed with early-onset Alzheimer's at age 65. Determined that she would continue to live with compassionate support, her family turned to PACE CNY to help guide her care through this difficult journey.

"At first, we didn't know if our mom was a good fit for PACE CNY. She was young, and she didn't need all the services that PACE provides, but after she was enrolled, we saw how it was helping her manage her Alzheimer's and overall care," said her son, Patrick.

He shared that it was the all-inclusive care, like the medical equipment, supplies, and in-home support, that

made a difficult time easier for his family. PACE CNY set up a room with a mechanical bed and a Hoyer lift so Gayle could spend her last days surrounded by family. A PACE CNY aide came three times a day to provide personal care.

Gayle's medical care was managed by Desta Anthony, a Nurse Practitioner who specializes in the treatment of Alzheimer's and dementia. Desta grew close to Gayle and her children during the three years she cared for their mom, and she helped transition Gayle from living in a Loretto community to her daughter's home before she passed.

Patrick believes PACE CNY made a difficult time easier. "Over the course of five weeks, my brother, sister, and I never left her side, and we had the honor of being there for her last breath. I always tell people this, and it sounds so crazy, but it was the hardest and most beautiful experience I've ever gone through. And if I could go back, I would. I would do those five weeks over again, and that's because PACE made it possible," he said.

Opening Doors: How Your Support Changed a Family's Future

On September 30, Alice Cruz proudly watched her son, Angelo, walk across the stage to receive his certificate for graduating as a licensed practical nurse, thanks to the LPN Apprenticeship Program at Loretto.

When she moved to the area, Alice had a hard time finding work with no prior experience in food service. Angelo said that Loretto "took a chance" on Alice, a single mother trying to provide for her two children, by offering the necessary training to work in the dining room; first as a server and now as a manager.

With Alice's encouragement, Angelo and his sister, Kristel, both enrolled in and successfully graduated from the Certified Home Health Aide (CHHA) Program and gained employment at The Nottingham.

After working as a CHHA for two years, Angelo was accepted into Loretto's successful LPN Apprenticeship Program. Today, he serves alongside his mother and colleagues as an LPN, and Alice has

achieved her own dream of owning her first home.

"Loretto has been good to our family. We all have good employment and chances to earn certifications, which have helped our family. Recently, my mom purchased her first home, which was a big deal for us. We are thankful for the opportunity to work at Loretto," said Angelo.

It is through the support of our donors that paid training programs help people like Angelo, Kristel, and Alice access educational opportunities they would not have otherwise, enabling them to build and advance their healthcare careers. Angelo was one of 15 employees to graduate from the 6th class of the LPN Apprenticeship Program and joins a community of over 63 Loretto employees who have advanced their careers.

We Are Proud to Announce: Loretto Earns Five-Star Ratings Across All Three Skilled Nursing Facilities

For the first time in Loretto's history, all three of our skilled nursing facilities have simultaneously earned the highest possible 5-Star Quality Rating from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS).

Loretto Health & Rehabilitation, The Nottingham Residential Health Care Facility in Syracuse, and The Commons on St. Anthony in Auburn have each received this distinction reserved for organizations that meet the most rigorous national standards for care, staffing, and safety. To put this achievement in perspective, only two other small facilities within a 25-mile radius hold this same designation.

"This is a significant accomplishment for all three facilities and a testament to the hard work of our employees fulfilling Loretto's mission to provide exceptional care each day," said Loretto President and CEO, Dr. Kimberly Townsend. "It is also worth noting that all facilities, no matter the size, are measured by the same quality standard, so for a facility as large as Loretto Health & Rehabilitation that is home to over 500 residents to earn this 5-star rating is truly remarkable."

Behind each star are compassionate caregivers, innovative programs, and the generous donors who help make exceptional care possible for older adults in our community. This is a reflection

of our unwavering commitment to excellence and a promise of what is still to come.



Why Montessori Matters: Finding Purpose in Giving Back

Meet Marylyn. For more than ten years, she worked as a hostess at Dibello's, a local restaurant located on the west side of Syracuse. She loved interacting with the customers and would step in to help the servers when it was busy.

Today, as an assisted living resident at Buckley Landing, she's putting her Dibello's experience to good use as a dining room volunteer.

Thanks to the Montessori approach to senior care, residents are encouraged to use their skills to give back to their communities in ways that they enjoy.

For Marylyn, it's serving others in the dining room. She helps prepare meals in the kitchen, sets up the dining room, and delivers food as a volunteer.

Marylyn said, "I have the experience, and I enjoy doing it. I love the people here, and it makes me feel good to give back."

Buckley Landing is one of three Loretto communities that are gold certified out of the 42 nationwide, and it is the only one to offer this care in Upstate New York. All Loretto skilled nursing and assisted facilities are participating

in Montessori training programs, which have bronze, silver, and gold-level certifications. Our donors make it possible for residents to wake up each morning with somewhere to be, something to contribute, and someone who believes in their potential. The goal is to have all communities receive gold certification from the Center for Applied Research in Dementia by the end of 2026.

Addressing the Growing Need for Healthcare Staff

Central New York faces a significant and growing need for healthcare workers and Loretto is meeting that challenge head-on. With the support of a three-year, \$1.3 million workforce development grant from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation, Loretto transformed underused campus space into a state-of-the-art Learning Center that is redefining how future nurses are trained.

Opened in fall 2025, the tech-enabled facility features video conferencing, a nursing library, and an advanced simulation lab where students develop real-world clinical skills in a hands-on environment. The center strengthens Loretto's CNA and LPN Apprenticeship programs, expands clinical rotations, and deepens partnerships with BOCES and the Syracuse City School District—ensuring graduates enter the workforce confident, career-ready, and prepared to lead.

This is what philanthropic investment makes possible. Not only advancing education, but directly strengthening the quality of care our community will depend on for generations to come.
